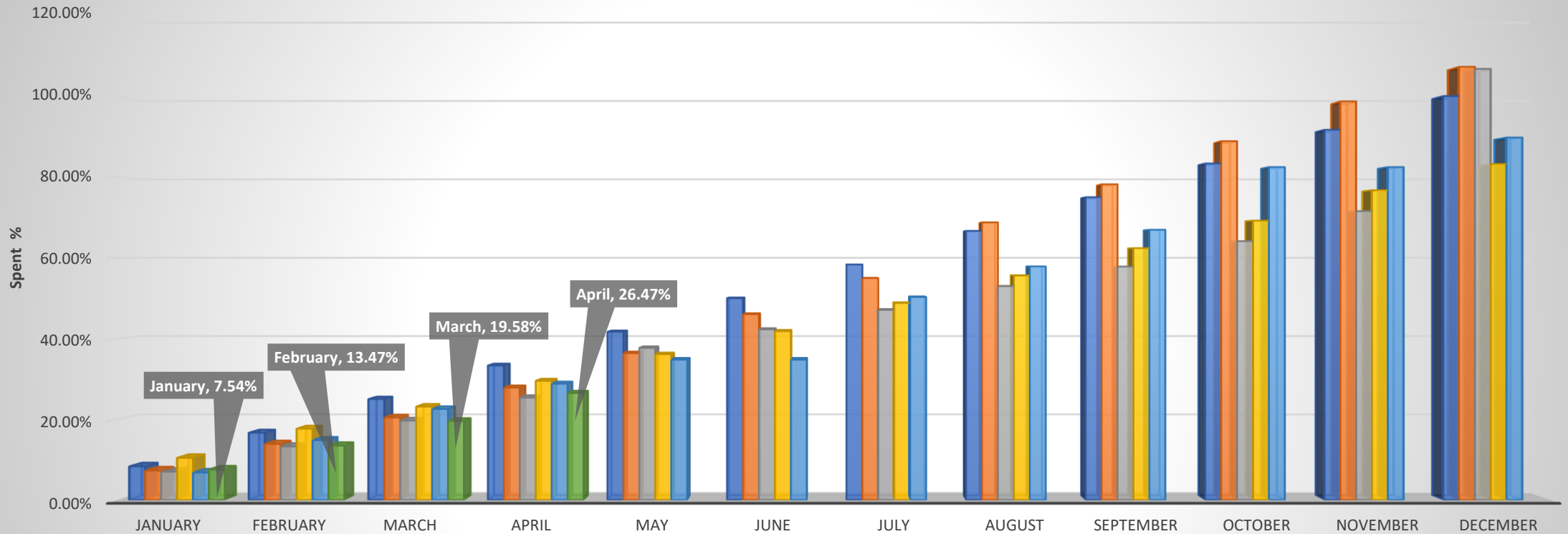

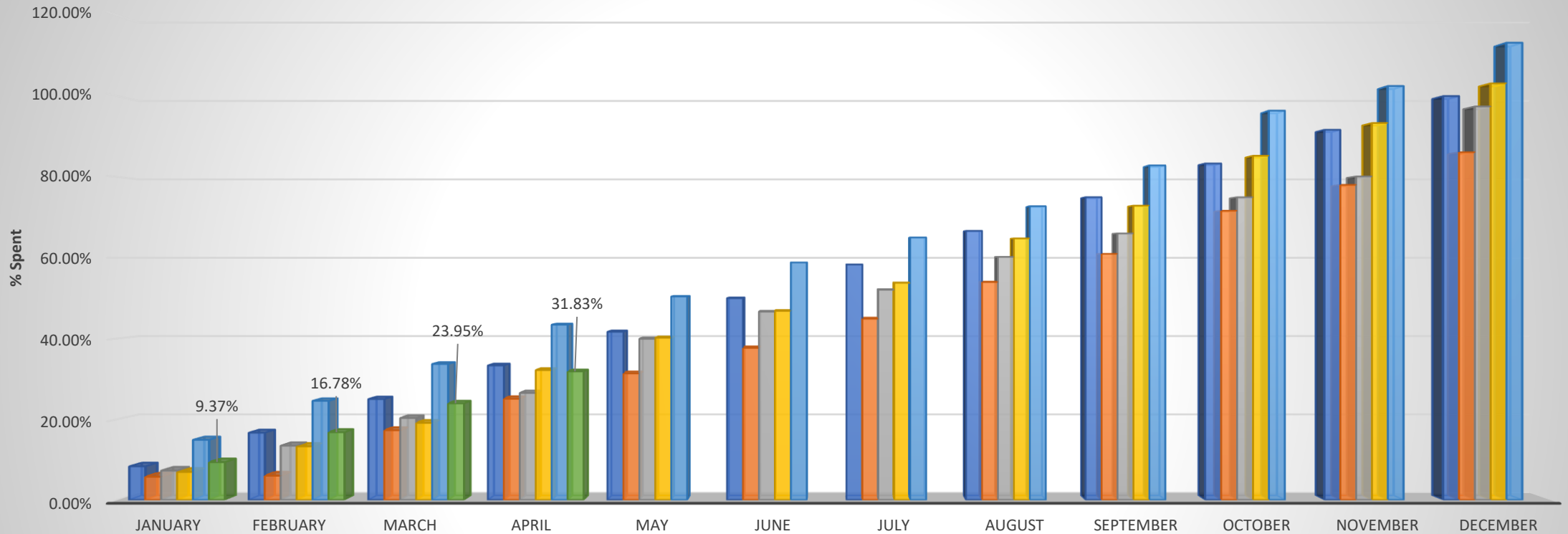

Quaytskin

Artwork Description

Quaytskin is a contemporary interpretation of a Welcome Figure, a traditional marker of place, and true land acknowledgment for the Chinookan people who have called the villages along the lower Columbia River home for thousands of years.

The two-sided figure looks to the river, toward the traditional smelt and salmon fisheries, while the opposite side faces the mountains, honoring the gathering sites for food and medicines. The open-structured design explores both masculine and feminine energy while allowing one to peer through to the other side - representing the spectrum of gender identity and referencing 2-Spirit and Third-Gendered peoples within native communities. Each material and element reinforce a connection to this place. The heads are carved from Western Red Cedar, the body is cut out with imagery of local symbols and plants, and the paint used was created from natural pigments collected in the area.

Quaytskin offers the opportunity to revitalize a nearly forgotten art form that originated in this region, bringing attention to its earliest inhabitants, while acting as a signal of goodwill to all who now call this place Home.

The Artist

Travis Stewart is a contemporary artist of Chinook and Kalapuya descent. He is a citizen of the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde and his familial ties to this area date back to time immemorial. He works in a variety of mediums to depict stories and traditional designs defined by the cultural landscape of Western Oregon.



When Trees Heal the Earth

This section of the Eagle View Park has been planted with native tree species to renew and maintain the health of this site. Local developer, Killian Pacific, worked in collaboration with Salmon-Safe and various partners to identify over 13 species of native plants, carefully selected for their restorative qualities.

Red Alder

The Red Alder tree grows quickly and contains high levels of nitrogen, benefiting the soil and plants nearby. These trees are excellent hosts for butterfly and bird habitats.



Western Red Cedar

An icon of the Pacific Northwest, the Western Red Cedar tree offers ample shade while stabilizing the soil and riverbanks - providing a safe habitat for surrounding wildlife. This tree was also an important part of many local Indigenous communities and was used for ceremonial head dresses, building homes, and canoes.



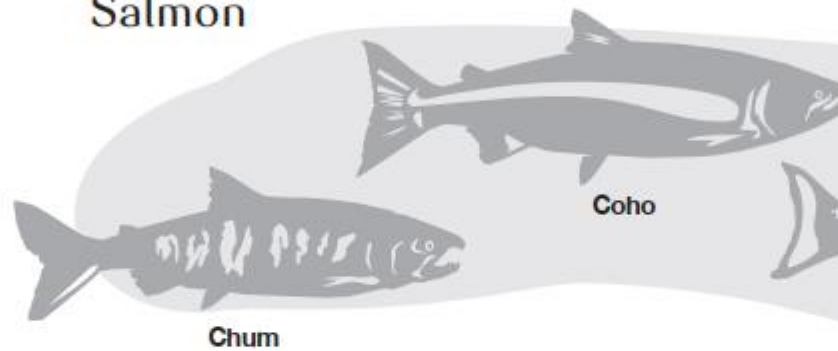
What's Swimming Out There?

There was a time...

when millions of fish could be found here. In fact, the Chinook Salmon species was so abundant here that it was named for the Chinook Tribe, which was one of the primary populations of Indigenous people that lived and fished the river. Fishing is important to all the tribes in this area, both for income and as a primary food source. The Salmon symbolizes abundance, fertility, prosperity, and renewal for local tribal communities.

This Discovery Garden is doing its part to help our local fish populations recover by recreating native habitat, eliminating toxic pesticides and fertilizers from the landscape, and planting specific trees that aim to create shade and mitigate climate change.

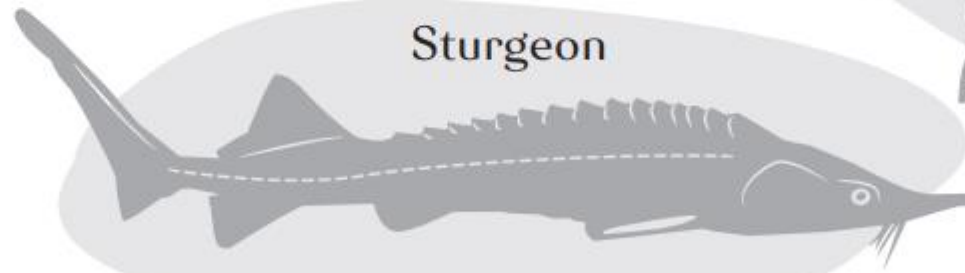

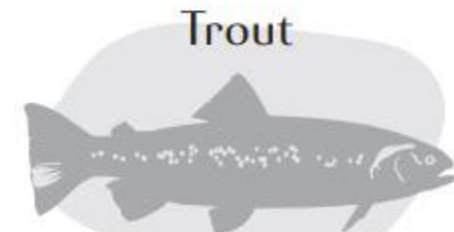

How is a Park Salmon-Safe?

This Discovery Garden was designed to Salmon-Safe standards that protect & renew natural habitats for wildlife.

Salmon-Safe

is an environmental non-profit organization that guides landowners and developers to plan and design sites with the health of salmon and other species in mind. Salmon-Safe brings scientists and other experts together to evaluate and advise how best to protect natural habitats and water quality. These teams provide insights on how to keep the water clean by managing storm water on site, reduce water consumption through efficient irrigation, where to plant drought tolerant plants, and how to eliminate harmful fertilizers and pesticides. This effort helps mitigate climate change impacts on our lands and waters.

Salmon-Safe is dedicated to protecting the environment as well as honoring the cultural identity of the Indigenous communities of Oregon and Washington. When you safeguard fish populations in the Columbia River, you are helping sustain tribal fishing traditions while ensuring a site operates the way nature intended.

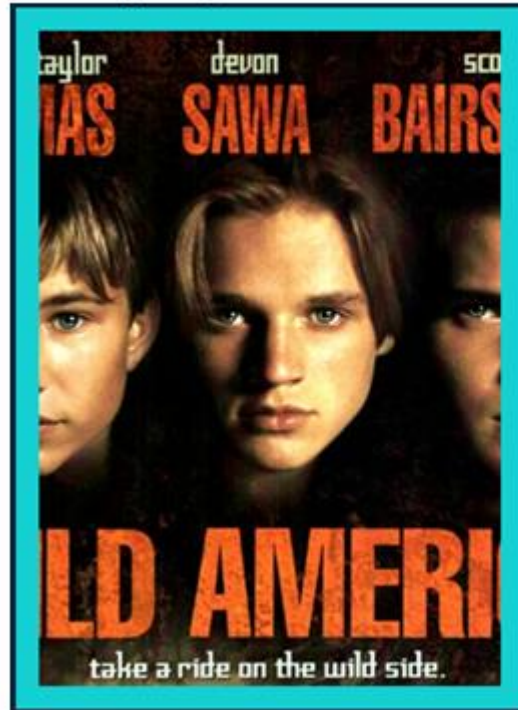

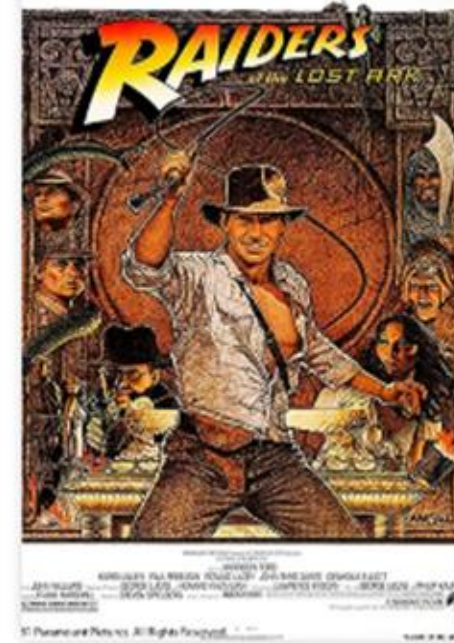

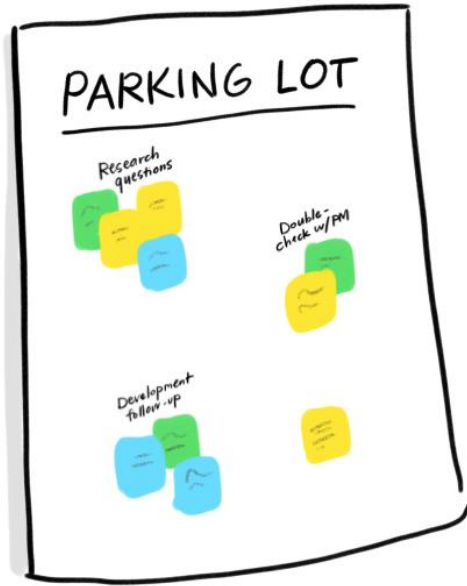
